A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

We all read novels differently. Some of us like to begin at page one and work faithfully through all the twists and turns of the plot until we arrive at the last page. Others of us actually prefer to skip ahead to the last chapter before returning to the opening chapter so that as we read we have a sense of what everything is moving towards.

We commence another church year with the season of Advent. In some ways, beginning with Advent is a little like reading the last chapter first in a novel. The church begins its liturgical year by directing our attention to the grand finale – Jesus' Second Coming and the fulfillment of all of God's promises in creation through his Son. The journey through Advent is the reading of a story backwards. We work our way back from Jesus' Second Coming at the outset of Advent to his First Coming in all the vulnerability and humility of a baby born in a feed-trough as Advent concludes and Christmas begins.

While it may seem back-to-front to those of us who like to begin with page one, what does Advent's announcing the end at the beginning and reading the story backwards teach us? Fr. Tim Connor at St. George's London highlights three learnings.

First, there is a point to it all. History has a purpose. Our lives are not random, chaotic and meaningless. It's not a case of just 'one damned thing after another' as Huxley lamented. God is moving us all towards his appointed end for all that God has created and restored. When we are tempted to despair because nothing seems to make sense, or that we appear to be taking steps backward, or that the challenges facing us seem insurmountable, it is good to recall that Someone has it all in hand. We reaffirm that our shared life has a goal and we can make choices on the basis of that goal. We allow God to shape our lives confident both in God's love for us and in God's desire and ability to make good on his promises to us. God's ultimate purpose for us and for all creation will prevail – an outcome the goodness of which is beyond our wildest imaginings.

Second, the story of Jesus unfolded just as God intended it to unfold. His birth in a barn in Bethlehem, his early years with Mary and Joseph in Nazareth, his public ministry of teaching and healing in Galilee, his trial, torture and execution

in Jerusalem, his emerging from a stone-cold tomb three days later, and his ascending into heaven before his stunned disciples was all part of God's plan for the healing and restoration of everything God has made. What happened to Jesus was not some cosmic screw-up; God was not caught napping. On the contrary, we say that God makes himself fully known to us, fully present to us, not only in Jesus, but as Jesus. If we want to know what God looks like, we need look no further than Jesus. Jesus is God with a human face.

Third, because Jesus is Emmanuel, God with us and God for us, it means that Jesus is the key – the key to the unfolding of history and the key to the culmination of history. That's what Christmas is about. During Advent, we do ring the changes on different themes of our life in God through Christ: peace, hope, joy and love. What Christmas reminds us is that those themes find their most complete and fulsome expression not in a treatise, nor in a campaign, nor even in a movement. We see the perfection of these principles in a person – Jesus of Nazareth, the One whose birth Christmas is all about. Jesus shows us what these virtues look like in the cut-and-thrust of lived human life.

It is why Advent and Christmas belong together. If we do Christmas without Advent, we risk remaining mired in the past – a sentimental story about a baby who got off to a rough start in life without even a decent cot. If we do Advent without Christmas, we may be tempted to focus on this vague (and at times pretty scary) future which can frankly seem way 'out there.' We need both Advent and Christmas, reading backwards from the end to the beginning so that God can show us his presence and activity in moving all of creation to its appointed end through the life, death and resurrection of his Son. Of course, Advent and Christmas lead us into Epiphany, the season during which we gaze upon God's light shining in the face of his Son, a light that shines into the darkest corners of whatever we are living, a light that illumines our paths and guides us into the way of peace.

Felicity, Sophie, Lynn and I wish you all the hope, peace, joy and love Jesus embodies throughout the season of Advent, Christmas and Epiphany. Together may we celebrate God's presence with us and God's work in and through us during these seasons of the new Church year.

'I have come that you might have life and life in all its fullness,' Jesus promises us in John's Gospel (10.10). The fullness of our life together at St. Mark's is something for which I give thanks and pray that it may continue to witness to the One who gifts us this life in his Son.

The second Friday is becoming one of the highlights of the month for me. God is blessing us with continued growth in our Messy Church as we meet at 5pm to do crafts, listen to a story, sing and pray, and share a meal. I rejoice in the connections that are happening and the relationships that are developing. Whilst it all sounds simple enough, there is an inordinate amount of preparation that goes into each gathering. I am deeply grateful for Pat's leadership and for the contribution of members of the core team and our army of helpers, especially those who are preparing meals for over 80 people! Keep it up!

We enjoyed a double-header in our life on Oct 1. In the morning Neil Dunning and the Environment Committee organized a first-rate workshop on 'Greening Sacred Spaces.' There were over 30 in attendance as we listened to presentations from a variety of speakers (including Sarah Ogilvie) and a panel discussion from local tradespeople. With recent statistics indicating that the 15 of the 16 hottest years on record have occurred this century (the other was in 1998), it is vital that we keep looking at ways in which faith communities can offer leadership in reducing our carbon footprint. It is a privilege to be serving a community which is bearing a torch for others. Well done! In the afternoon, the Brant Anglican Refugee Committee hosted a meet-and-greet for our Syrian family: Khaled and Nour, their children Walid and Alisar, and Khaled's mum, Nawal. There was a steady stream of folk throughout the afternoon and some great food. The family is coping so well with what remains a significant transition for them. My heartfelt thanks for your support of them in all manner of ways. Both Khaled and Nawal have needed extensive dental treatment which has been costly, even with a substantial discount offered by a local dentist. The Committee continues to welcome donations (which qualify for a tax receipt).

It is heartening to get together with Anglicans throughout Brantford and Brant County for Christian formation. We have just concluded a six week series on Wednesday evenings called *'Spirit of Invitation'*, a resource from the Diocese of Toronto. Through a blend of Scripture, video clips and personal stories we have considered different ways in which we can share our faith,

Some of you will recall the Bennett family's time with us at St. Mark's from 1986-1991. The Diocese gave Bishop Bob and Kathie a rousing send-off on Fri. Oct. 14th as a number of folk paid tribute to their ministry in Huron spanning 42 years. We pray for them both as they move into a well-earned retirement. Breaking news is that Bishop Linda's installation as the 13th Bishop of Huron on Sat. Nov. 26 will not be at St. Paul's Cathedral but at Metropolitan United Church, owing to structural issues with the trusses at the Cathedral. Please pray for Bishop Linda as she picks up the reins in particularly challenging times, and pray for the Cathedral community as they make difficult decisions about care for our mother church.

Many of you probably roll your eyes when you hear mention of a visioning conversation! At the same time, these conversations remain so important for discerning the priorities we believe God is laying on our hearts at St. Mark's. Marilyn Malton returned on Sun. Oct. 23 to facilitate our discussion. I am grateful to those who attended and offered their reflections. We took time to name places of celebration and of pain and challenge this past year, and reviewed the recommendations put forward by Kayla Forrester and Adrian in their Community Engagement report. We continue to focus on those priorities we identified two years ago:

- Children, youth and young families
- Connecting with others
- Sharing God's gifts

Specifically in 2017, we will explore ways in which we can incorporate more of our children and youth into our Sunday worship at 10.30am on a regular basis. We will also investigate offering a regular movie night for kids on a Friday evening between Messy Church gatherings and look to advertise those in the community housing complexes in our neighbourhood. We recognize that we will need to give continued attention to our finances as the costs of ministry climb – ministry costs; good ministry costs more. We want to promote and encourage a culture of generosity as a primary way of responding to God's unfathomable generosity and kindness towards us.

One of the many ways in which I sense the Holy Spirit moving in our midst is through our engagement with our sisters and brothers from Six Nations. Our Sacred Circle continues to offer events to assist with this process. The Province of Ontario recently observed its inaugural Treaties Recognition Week from Nov. 6-13. A Lutheran/Anglican working group organized a Blanket Exercise which we hosted on Wed. Nov. 9 and two presentations on treaties at the Woodland Cultural Centre followed by a talking circle at the Mohawk Chapel on Sun. Nov. 13. Attendance exceeded our expectations at both events. I was especially grateful for the support of our MPP Dave Levac, who strongly encouraged us to offer programmes next year. It is a superb way of connecting with those beyond our walls.

As I write, Jim Howarth is receiving the last of the boxes for Operation Christmas Child. He tells me that we have exceeded last year's total of 2009 boxes by 466 boxes for a total of 2475. We are deeply grateful to all those who have assisted with this significant logistical exercise and who have contributed boxes. It is a service to the people of Brantford and of course to the Northern communities who will be the recipients of your generosity. God bless you all.

The Fall has been a time of significant transition for us as a community. We acknowledge with gratitude the significant contribution Christine Pizzey made to the administrative side of our life in the nearly two years she was with us. I am particularly grateful for the generosity of Kathy Dunning and Anne Walker in providing interim coverage in the office as the wardens seek to fill the position of parish coordinator. Erin and Adrian have informed the wardens that they will not be renewing their contract when Erin's maternity leave concludes in February. The wardens are hoping to appoint a youth ministry coordinator in the early New Year in order to provide some overlap before Adrian finishes up. Both Erin and Adrian have invested significantly in the lives of our youth on a number of levels for which we are very grateful. We shall miss them and wish them all well as they explore exciting ministry opportunities in Kitchener-Waterloo.

Our principal fundraiser is the Holly Jolly Faire, requiring substantial preparation. As you may be aware, the Smiths relocated to Germany over the summer which made it somewhat difficult for Crystal to continue as HJF coordinator! Laurie Murray and Vicki Corke stepped into the breach in September (aided and abetted by their husbands I understand) and have gone above and beyond in pulling things together on behalf of us all. We owe them and their team a huge debt of gratitude. Whilst we don't yet know what the Faire will generate, I can tell you that without their efforts we would have a much larger gap to make up before year end. Thanks so much.


