## From the Rector's Desk

**P**reston Pouteaux is a beekeeper, a fan of neighbourhoods and pastor at Lake Ridge Community Church. It's probably not surprising that he would see a connection between beehives and the church. In his recent book *The Bees of Rainbow Falls: Finding Faith, Imagination and Delight in Your Neighbourhood*, he suggests that as beehives are essential for the production of many foods that we enjoy today (take apples and almonds for example), so the church is essential for the health and well-being of our societies. Just as the collapse of hives would have a dramatic effect on our food chain, so the collapse of the church would have a profound impact on our neighbourhoods. He reminds us that we matter to our community, that there is goodness all around us and that God is bringing new life in the places we least expect.

In the face of the considerable transition we are experiencing in the church and in the world, it becomes even more important that we embrace the seasons of Advent, Christmas and Epiphany as we wait for the 'appearing' of Jesus Christ, the one who brought and brings new life in the places we least expect. We commence another church year by looking forward in the direction to which all of history is tending – that is the fulfilment of God's plan for the healing and restoration of all creation. During Advent we wait for Christ's appearing as One who presides over a new creation, a reign, a time and a place where God's justice and peace prevail and all of creation experiences the abundance of God's life. Over Christmas, we celebrate the way in which God has accomplished this work in the life, death, resurrection and ascension of the baby born in a barn, Jesus of Nazareth. Jesus is the Prince of Peace, whose perfect peace enfolds us and transforms us. In Epiphany we praise and thank God for those signs and wonders indicating that God really is at work in his Son and revealing God's glory to us. Advent, Christmas and Epiphany remind us that we find ourselves in the in-between time of the 'already' and 'not yet' of God's new way of being for us all.

What this means is that all that God inspires and empowers in our midst – both in terms of who we are as his people and of what we get out of our life together – becomes a way of pointing to the appearing of Jesus and to this in-breaking Reign which Jesus has initiated and which God by his Spirit will bring to completion. It's why I love to celebrate all that God has accomplished in, with and through in this past year and to take time to open ourselves – heart, mind and soul – and to listen to where God is bidding us move in the coming year. It is as we thank and praise God not only for what God has done and is doing with us, but also in what God intends to do with us, that we live into the growth of God's mission through our life together at 155 Memorial. As we continue to focus on welcoming and nurturing our children, youth and young families through Messy Church and other initiatives; as we

## From the Christian Generosity Team

For three weeks in September and October our focus was to provide our wardens and finance committee with an estimate of our givings for 2018.

Prior to the campaign, nine volunteers contacted members of our congregation and found 28 parishioners who volunteered to visit ten families each in our parish to deliver our information package. With the help of these 28 people, we were able to make contact with everyone on our parish role. We are pleased to report that 96 intention cards have been returned to date. We feel very confident that the results of this fall programme will assist the finance committee in their budget deliberations for 2018.

It was also very encouraging to see the strong St. Mark's turnout for the Deanery workshop on Saturday, October 14<sup>th</sup> that St. Mark's hosted as part of our fall campaign. The workshop was offered by a Diocesan team and was a pilot for a workshop that will be used in Deaneries across the Diocese.

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# Treaties Recognition Week

On Sunday, November 5<sup>th</sup>, several members of St. Mark's attended a meeting at Woodland Cultural Centre to listen to a presentation from two women who lived at the residential school during the fifties and late sixties to early seventies. The session was deeply moving. Dave Levac (MPP and Speaker of the House) was there and said that he walked across the lawn of the residential school each day on his way to school and had no idea about what was happening at the residential school.

For one woman who was born into a happy family, the residential school was a place of loneliness and learned helplessness. She was separated and isolated from her siblings. Fighting amongst residents was common because the children were left on their own with no direction or care; there were only two 'officers' (house mothers) to oversee 60 students. She didn't even learn to read when she was there, instead the children performed menial tasks for half of the school day. She also related a report by her sibling who later told her of her own sexual abuse. Finally she left the school and went to live with a foster family and eventually became an elementary school teacher.

Another woman arrived at the school because of the drunken turmoil in her mother's home and she said the school was a safe place from the rest of her life even though she was surprised to be hit there for the first time in her life. She eventually learned to forgive her mother. She found out that her maternal grandmother had attended the residential school and had never learned how to be in a happy family; her grandmother had only the fear of punishment to guide her life.

Each woman gave us a picture of how complex each story and family situation was and how the residential schools were tied into the children's aid and foster home programmes.

Through their stories it was encouraging to see that both women had reconciled much of what had happened in their lives; the latter through extensive counselling, relearning the Mohawk language and attending longhouse; the former through reconnecting with family members and through her faith in the protection of Jesus. One message to all of us attending was "do whatever you need to do to reconcile any trauma you have experienced in your life."
