## FROM THE RECTOR'S DESK

**W**e never know when these encounters might happen. A friend was describing recently a conversation she had with a heavily tattooed sales clerk at a local store. My friend shared that she too recently had gotten her first tattoo. 'What is it?' asked the clerk. My friend told her it was a fish, a symbol of Christian faith. (Back in the days of persecution in the early church, Christians would use the symbol as a secret way of signaling their faith without arousing suspicion from others – the first letters in the Greek alphabet of Jesus Christ Son of God, Saviour spelt ΙΧΘΥΣ or ichthys which translates as 'fish' in Greek). 'So what has Christ ever done for you?' the clerk shot back. It wasn't a question my friend was expecting. She gathered herself and responded that Christ had done three things she could think of: Christ had sustained her throughout her life – in good times and in bad; Christ had protected both her family and her when they had been living in challenging surroundings in the Arctic; Christ continued to guide her throughout the day in choices she needed to make. It was the clerk's turn to ponder. Then she asked if she could stop by for a visit with my friend because she wanted to find out more about Christ. We never know when an opportunity might present itself.

Advent is a time of preparation. It is a season of waiting. Sure, we are preparing ourselves to celebrate God's First Coming into our midst in all the vulnerability and innocence of a newborn crying to be fed in a barn. We are also awaiting expectantly God's Second Coming, Jesus' triumphant return. He is the One before whom every knee will bow and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is indeed Lord. Advent is also a time when we allow God to attune us and to sensitise us to the myriad of ways God is already showing up in our daily lives – as God chose to show up in my friend's day through her encounter with a store clerk.

Sometimes, we do need to slow down and pay attention, because God, the all-powerful One who put it all aside to assume the struggles and challenges of our day-to-day lives, often comes to us in small, hidden and unexpected ways. The mystery of Christmas is that God engages with us as one of us – weak, broken, vulnerable,

subject to illness, frustration and disappointment – that we might know God is with us and for us, and will never, ever, ever let us go. This is how Martin Luther expressed the truth in a Christmas sermon in 1530: *If Christ had arrived with trumpets and lain in a cradle of gold, his birth would have been a splendid affair. But it would not be a comfort to me. He was rather to lie in the lap of a poor maiden and be thought of little significance in the eyes of the world. Now I can come to him. Now he reveals himself to the miserable in order not to give any impression that he arrives with great power, splendor, wisdom, and aristocratic manners.*

Is this something we struggle to understand, let alone recognise and experience? Of course, it is! It's one of the reasons the church gives us the season of Advent. Truth be told, we need at least four weeks to welcome this truth once again – that God has done everything, and still does everything, to reveal to us God's all-sustaining, ever-protecting and constantly guiding love to which my friend was able to testify in her conversation with the store clerk.

This Advent and Christmas, may God surprise you yet again with just how far God is willing to go to communicate his all-embracing and fathomless love for you and for all those whom you hold dear.

A blessed Advent, Christmastide and Epiphanytide to you and your loved ones.

## SOME NEWS AND NOTES

**H**earfelt thanks to all those who have contributed to the Daily Bread gift card programme. As you may recall, the funds you have contributed have been used in the past to purchase \$20 gift cards for clients at the Daily Bread Christmas dinner. In consultation with Lil Paul, Parish Council has decided to allocate funds donated for gift cards this year to next year's programme. All children will continue to receive a gift this year. Next year, with the support of a very generous donation from the Foresters and using accumulated funds from your donations, St. Mark's is planning to put together gift bags for the clients.

Thank you too to those who generously support the Rector's Discretionary Fund. This Fund allows me to respond to specific financial needs 'at my discretion.' Those needs may include assistance with food, medication and medical supplies, rental assistance, emergency accommodation or financial support during work interruption. Without disclosing any information which might reveal the identity of those needing help, it is my practice to consult with the treasurer before making any disbursement as a way of ensuring accountability for how the funds are deployed. At our October meeting, Parish Council recently indicated their support for a monthly contribution of \$100 from the Discretionary Fund to the Children's Breakfast Programme at Northland Gardens, the community housing project south of St. Mark's on Memorial Drive. The programme currently offers breakfast to 57 children on three mornings per week at a cost of \$0.80 per meal. Through our contribution, the organisers will be able to offer more nutritious breakfasts to a greater number of kids. Thanks be to God.



By the time you are reading this, we will have completed Alpha, a course introducing participants to the Christian faith. I have been delighted with the response to the programme from folk both within and outside the St. Mark's community. The number of friendships which have developed amongst participants over the Fall has been especially encouraging. My hope and prayer is that some of the table groups will continue meeting as small groups after the course concludes. Our thanks to all those who have worked hard to support the programme: those who have set up, cooked, cleaned up and hosted table groups. Our thanks to Christine Fournier who not only coordinated the event, but had her hands in the sink while we were watching the DVD presentations.
