ishop Linda used a term in her charge to Synod that caught my attention. She spoke of 'missional apprenticeship'—learning mission by doing mission and then reflecting on what we are doing. It's what happened for Jesus' first disciples — a 'continuous cycle... of sending out — coming back — reflecting/learning — sending again. They were in a missional apprenticeship —learning as you go!' Indeed, as she notes, this is what life is like — 'an extended engagement in this same praxis — learning what is needed to respond to this moment so that God's kingdom may be seen and known.' As John Dewey reportedly wrote, 'We don't learn from experience, we learn by reflecting on experience.' Usually when I set out into unfamiliar territory, I want to make sure I have figured out how I might respond to different scenarios before I leave home. Only Jesus' first disciples show us a different way. Again in the Bishop's words,

... we see disciples who are not united in themselves; with different agendas (political, spiritual, personal....); often barely grasping the significance of what they were hearing or seeing; sent out into the world to proclaim what they did know. And God used their willingness, their faith, their courage, in all their frailty, to be those who transmit the Good News of the Kingdom and love it into birth both before and after the death and resurrection of Jesus.

So it is to be with us. We may not have all the 'i's dotted and 't's crossed; we may not know where exactly it is all leading; we may not know precisely how we are going to get there. As apprentices,

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we are simply called to learn as we go, and to put into practice what we are learning.

We are called to a way to live in this crazy, upside down world that loves, heals, forgives, renews and creates. It is an apprenticeship as an apostle - an apprenticeship we enter at baptism and continue every day of our lives until we are called home to God. We are SENT INTO THE WORLD TO LIVE AND PROCLAIM THE KINGDOM OF GOD.

Our journey with Jesus is an adventure – life's greatest adventure. The best part about the adventure for me is that it is a shared adventure, an adventure together. At St. Mark's we are discovering together what being a healthy, vibrant and generous people of God looks like in a world that looks less and less like the world many of us grew up in. We discover by doing and reflecting. As importantly we discover by enjoying the journey, by trusting that God is with us, that God has our back and that God wants us to adapt and flourish way more than even we ourselves may want it. It is with this trust, that in the words of the good folk at the Lombard Mennonite Peace Centre, God gives us the grace to 'stay calm, stay connected and stay the course.'

What undergirds this process of discovery through doing and reflecting is prayer. Prayer is the lifeblood of the process. Rowan Williams, the former Archbishop of Canterbury, reminds us that prayer is where we are most simply and most obviously in the company of Jesus. We attend and we absorb as we ask for God's grace to quiet our minds and bodies. We focus on simply being God's beloved child in the presence of our loving Parent. The heart of prayer resembles lying on a sunbed, bathing in the warm rays of God's love. We are simply being where God's light and love is. As St. Augustine says somewhere in his Confessions the issue is not so much that God is not there, but that we are not much of the time. Often we are all over the map, distracted and preoccupied by our concerns and our obsessions. Praying is simply about arriving, arriving where we are at – as beloved children in the presence of a loving Parent, deeply connected to one another and to the world around us. We learn again the basic truth that God is a generous God, out of whose generosity we have become who we are. We may touch our own vulnerability, but also our own beauty in that moment. God reminds us that we are because God is, that God is a God who loves being God and that God loves what God creates. In prayer, we allow this

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truth to permeate our deepest being and it is this truth that is the bedrock of all that we do and reflect on and learn as apprentices, missional apprentices of Jesus.

May the summer be an opportunity for us all to discover more what it means to be a missional apprentice of Jesus, those who are learning first and foremost what it is to rest in God's fathomless love through prayer.



It is a joy for me personally to have Rev. Ryan Sim help us reflect more intentionally on what it means as a community to be missional apprentices of Jesus in our neighbourhood. Ryan initiated the conversation at a workshop at the end of March through an in-depth look at who is actually living in the surrounding area. The process continued at Parish Council in May as we began to think of initiatives that might make a difference in the lives of particular folk we had identified. My hope and prayer is that we will settle on a specific project that we would commit to experimenting with in the Fall. Ryan has also met with the wardens and some staff to get a better handle on what we are thinking and feeling as we discern carefully where God is leading us. Please pray for Ryan and for this vital conversation we are engaged in. If you have any questions or concerns about the process, please be in touch with me personally. It is important to me that we are fully informed about what we are doing and as importantly why we are doing it.

Thank you for your willingness to explore the feasibility of partnering with other churches and individuals in the community to sponsor another refugee family. One of the highlights in ministry for me personally in our time together has been watching the way in which Khaled and his family have created a new life for

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themselves here in Brantford over the past three years. They have done amazingly well. By the time you are reading this, we will have met with folk who are interested in supporting this next initiative and will have a better idea of our financial resources and of individuals who are able to take on specific tasks. I emphasise that, as with Khaled's family, St. Mark's would be working in partnership with others. I am very grateful for the initiative, passion and vision of Mieke Schroeder as she helps us to assess this God-given opportunity.

I feel so blessed to have had time after Easter in our Companion Diocese of Amazonia, as Huron renews our covenant with Amazonia for another five years. The trip was an extraordinary experience as I shared with some of you after coffee hour on Sunday, May 26th. Aside from the overwhelming hospitality and the stunning array of foods many of which I had never seen before, I was deeply impressed with the Diocese's sense of mission. They model for me what it means to be a missional apprentice in our neighbourhood, particularly in their case through developing afterschool programmes to connect with children at risk. I was privileged to hear first-hand what a difference in the lives of kids the programmes are making – remedial education and music. My hope and prayer is that St. Mark's might consider partnering with another parish (or parishes) in the Diocese to help expand one of these parish-based programmes, as a way to build relationship with our friends in Amazonia. I am deeply thankful to Nigel Challen for how faithful he is in deepening our friendship with folk in the Diocese through regular email contact.

Another way in which are we already engaging as missional apprentices is through initiatives aimed at adding value to the lives of seniors. Laurie Murray and the Cooking Angels have been busy preparing nutritious meals for folk who for a variety of reasons may be needing support; Debbie Belowitz and the Health Council hosted an informative evening on Elder Abuse, which helped us identify what to look out for and the resources available to us. The Parish Visitor Team continues to meet regularly to review the needs of those who may be in a vulnerable space. I remain deeply grateful for all the ways in which the community of St. Mark's embraces Jesus' ministry of care.

An important act of Parish Council this spring was to adopt a photo policy for St. Mark's. With concerns about privacy issues, it is important for each of us to know how the church will approach photography during events. While we are concerned about privacy we also want to be able to celebrate our life together through sharing images on our website, in print, and on social media. In brief, the policy states that the church assumes that we can share photo images of large group shots without asking permission, but will ask before taking small group or individual photos. In either case, parishioners can ask that images be removed from circulation after the fact by contacting the office. Children may be photographed as part of large general group shots, but permission will always be asked of a parent before taking photographs of children in small groups, at children's events, or individually. Interested parishioners can obtain a copy of our photo policy by contacting the office.

Thank you to Parish Council for their work to review the activities of the parish each month and to work on and review details of policies, budgets, and so much more.

Being Mindful Stewards of Creation

o you know what 'single use plastic is'? It is the plastic that we all use once and then we dispose of it. At the recent Synod in the Diocese of Huron a motion was passed unanimously to reduce the use of single use plastics including rigid foam. Watch for a similar motion to the Anglican Church of Canada's General Synod in Vancouver this July. Our Full Communion Partner, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada, will likely be considering a similar resolution during the 2019 National Convention.

Motion to the Synod of the Diocese of Huron 2019

Subject: Seeking to reduce the of use of single use plas-

tics including rigid foam

Moved by: The Rev'd. Chris Brouillard-Coyle

Seconded by: Pamela Fulton

Recognizing that as Christians we are called to be mindful stewards of Creation and noting that there has been a growing concern about the effect of plastic on the environment, we recognize the harmful effects of single use plastics and the continued industrial production of the same, and recognizing that there are members of our communities who may require access to single-use plastic items in order to insure their full inclusion, and recognizing that we are called as Anglicans to live out our Baptismal Covenant and the 5th Mark of Mission, be it resolved that this diocesan synod:

- a) Encourage parishes of the Diocese of Huron and Huron Church House to reduce the purchase of products with single use plastics, including rigid foam (styrofoam and other brands), and to end such purchases by the beginning of 2023. Parishes are asked to include these actions in their 2020 Mission and Ministry Plan updates and review progress by the 2021 annual Vestry.
- b) Request the Justice League of Huron to provide educational resources to assist parishes and Huron Church House in the choosing of alternatives to single use plastics and to raise awareness throughout the Diocese.

hree years ago, the Anglican Churches in Brant Deanery sponsored a refugee family from Syria. They are doing well. We have the opportunity to sponsor again and with your support we can offer a safe refuge and a hope for a new beginning to another refugee family. Right now there is an opportunity to sponsor a family through a special programme where the government pays six months of living expenses, and a special fund (available for a short period) will pay the other six months. This means that the churches, as the sponsoring group, would be responsible for start-up costs (such as clothing and furniture) and for incidental costs.

To proceed, we are looking for support in two key areas: Settlement Support - When the family arrives, they will need help settling in Brantford. We need people who can support them especially in the area of education (enrolling them in ESL, enrolling the children in school and being the liaison with school). It would also be helpful to have someone who would be willing to look for training and work opportunities for the family. Financial Support - Our fundraising goal is \$15,000. The money will be used for start up costs and incidental costs such as dental bills, household items, supporting education needs. Your help would be greatly appreciated!
