common theme identified by one commentator amongst the five books shortlisted for the recently-announced Scotiabank Giller Prize, Canada's top literary award, is *Belonging*. It is one of the deep hungers in our heart Jean Vanier names in his book *Becoming Human*, which Rev. Margaret and Canon Bob explored with us earlier in November. If we as a people are yearning for a sense of belonging, it suggests that many of us are feeling lonely, isolated, even lost — disconnected from ourselves, from others, from creation... and ultimately from God.

It is the beautiful task of Advent to awaken in all of us memories of goodness and thus to open doors of hope.

What we celebrate at Christmas is God's choice to respond to this universal human condition of alienation and provide the means for each and every one of us to receive and discover a sense of belonging, of coming home, of being connected. God's decision was to enter this world as one of us – in all the vulnerability and tenderness of a baby, born to a teenage unwed mum forced to flee her homeland as a refugee. This infant of course would grow into a man, God/man, one who was both fully human and fully divine, whose life work was to announce and enact a new way of being with God, with each other and with ourselves. His mission was to overcome all that separates and disconnects us, so that each and every one of us could become the best version of

ourselves, the kind of person God has created us and intends us to be.

Of course, this new order of love Jesus introduced was one that challenged and threatened the old order, founded on dominance and control, on 'might makes right.' It led to his death in a state-sponsored execution. Only, as we know, death could not contain him and Jesus rose again on the third day, ushering in a new way of being together – a way of being together, inspired and empowered by Jesus'

As we enter the season of Advent, as we await expectantly Jesus' Second Coming and prepare to celebrate his First Coming as a baby born in a feed trough, may Jesus' Spirit instill in us a strong sense of belonging – belonging to God, belonging to the church, belonging to one another. May we know in our hearts this Christmas, that here at St. Mark's God has brought us home and that God calls us to extend the same welcome to others that we ourselves have first received.

AN UPDATE FROM OUR WARDENS

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t's been a busy Fall at St. Mark's and the Wardens have been working hard. We have some important items to share.

We would like to acknowledge Reverend Tim's efforts in the Episcopal election in Huron this past fall. Tim approached the election in the way that he approaches all of his work - with dedication, strong effort, and trust in God's leading. We recognize that Tim would have made an excellent Bishop for Huron, and we are thankful for the opportunity to serve God under Tim's leadership.

The Wardens were approached earlier this year by Mary Ogilvie to consider a land acknowledgement statement for St. Mark's. A land acknowledgement is an act of reconciliation that involves making a statement recognizing the traditional territory of Indigenous People who called the land home before the arrival of settlers. With the guidance of a local consultant knowledgeable in Indigenous issues and the sensibilities involved, Tim, the wardens and parish council agreed upon a simple statement that acknowledges the prior occupancy of the land and expresses gratitude for the sharing of this land for our ministry. The plaque has been placed in the entrance hallway beside the Indigenous timeline. The statement will appear on the screen before each of our Sunday services. Thank you to Mary for this thoughtful suggestion.

In late spring, the Diocese of Huron recommended that all churches commission a hazardous materials investigation and report in order to be compliant with the Ontario Occupational Health and Safety Act. This survey was conducted during the summer by T. Harris Environmental Management and the report has been received and reviewed. No surprising issues arose. As expected, asbestoscontaining materials were found in the floor tiles and black mastic tile adhesive in the older areas of the church – these areas were deemed priority 2, which means they may remain in place until those areas require upgrading or renovations. By law, our obligations are to inform any contractors of the presence of any and all designated hazardous materials before they bid on a project. Also, we are required to inform anyone doing maintenance or cleaning in the church of the presence of these materials. If you would like to read the report in full, hard copies are available in the parish office for review or an electronic version may be requested from Christine Fournier. If anyone is doing routine maintenance and/or renovations in the church, they will be asked to review and sign off that they are aware of the hazardous materials and their location.

It was also gratifying to see the number of folk who turned out for our Communion Assistants' workshop on Saturday, November 16th and we welcome Norm and Krystyna Mills, Ron Pierce, Sylvia Steele, Cindy Taylor, Dave Bailey and Donna Terdik who will be assisting with the chalice at Sunday worship.

A small adjustment to our Sunday services has been the offering of the rite of anointing for healing on the third Sunday of the month. As I mentioned in our last newsletter and in the bulletin, we will trial this rite for six months and then reevaluate. Given the challenges a number of us are facing, I am very pleased we are able now to offer this practice and thank Rev. Margaret Shortell and Canon Bob Schroeder for their assistance.

concert at Ohsweken on Sunday, a public lecture at Laurier on Wednesday and a screening of a documentary at St. Mark's on Thursday. As you may know, as rewarding as it is, reconciliation can be a long, challenging and painful journey. It takes time and effort to get to know each other and to build trust. I am grateful for those willing to travel the road together.

Sylvia Learn and her group established the Seniors' Communion and luncheon some 20 years ago. We host our seniors for a service and lunch afterwards four times a year. It is an important time of connection and fellowship and the food is great! A big shout out to Sylvia and the members of her team over the years as Sylvia now steps back. A great job well done. I am also thankful to the Wednesday Holy Communion group who have stepped up to further the legacy Sylvia and her team have left us.

Our work with Rev. Ryan Sim, our missional coach, continues. Ryan has met with staff and lay leaders, and has presented the results of his findings and his recommendations to Parish Council in both October and November. It is a gift to have someone of Ryan's faithfulness, experience as a church planter and competence to engage in this process with us. I am both excited and hopeful about some of the priorities and directions which are emerging. The staff and wardens are planning to meet in January to review the short-list of recommendations and identify areas of focus for the next two years. We hope to present these at Vestry for your input on February 2nd.

Daily Bread, the community meal programme which operates out of Grace Church on Wednesday evenings, celebrated its 20th anniversary on November 23rd, having served 151,006 meals across that period. It is an outstanding effort and one which has made a significant difference in the lives of some very vulnerable folk right here in our city. The initiative could not run without the dedication and commitment of volunteers, many of whom have been and are members of St. Mark's. Thank you so much to all those who have participated over the years and to those who still do. Lil Paul has been acting as coordinator in the afternoons and will be stepping back at the end of the year. She has made an enormous contribution to the running of the programme, especially in the last 18 months. We say thanks and wish her well as she continues to care for Wayne.

As I write, I am mindful of how much happens in our life in the Fall. I do want to thank the Christian Generosity Team for their intentional giving initiative, and especially for producing all the resources and monitoring our responses; our thanks too to Mieke Schroeder, Rev. Ron and Willa Pierce and Bob Langfrey for sharing with us what they value about our life at St. Mark's. I am very pleased that we are walking once again to Bethlehem and am grateful for the thought and creativity that has gone into the various events. Of course, no Fall at St.

I am also delighted to report that we have raised \$ 7,500 in support of the parish of the Lord's Annunciation Icoaraci in our companion diocese of Amazonia. They have embarked upon an ambitious project to renovate a house to serve as their church and a permanent home for their after-school music programme for children at risk in their neighbourhood. I am amazed by how much they offer these kids when they have so little themselves. I look forward to building a relationship with Rev. Elias and members of his small church, particularly through Nigel Challen's faithful correspondence with his friends in the Diocese. Please let me know if you are interested in finding out more about what is happening there.

Of course, your generosity too is more than evident at this time of the year as we fill shoeboxes for Samaritan's Purse. Packing boxes line the passageway and Munro Hall as I write. Thanks to those who have filled boxes and to Jim and Terry Howarth and their team, who so faithfully oversee the collection of the boxes each year. It is a big undertaking, and even more so this year, with the closure of a distribution depot in Kitchener/Waterloo. It is a valuable ministry, blessing those whom we may never meet.

No Advent newsletter would be complete with some acknowledgement of the noise, laughter and creative energy which fills both halls on the second Friday of each month at Messy Church. At our last gathering on November 15th, we welcomed 29 children along with their adult companions and our own volunteers. More than 70 people sat down for another sumptuous meal, care of the Walkers, Fredenburghs and Garabedians. Messy Church remains one of our primary vehicles for connecting with children and families for whom Sunday morning may not be the best fit. It takes an extraordinary amount of time and effort to host each event, and I wish to thank Pat McMillan, the core team and all those involved in various capacities who so faithfully roll up their sleeves month by month.

It was great to see a number of families who attend Messy Church and other families besides gather in Munro Hall on Sunday, November 24th to create banners and paint wooden nativity sets which Sharon Symington had cut out herself. It was a fun afternoon and a wonderful way to move into the Advent Season. Our thanks to Sharon for her initiative and generosity in sharing a special family memory with us.

I am very mindful too of those members of our community who are struggling with significant illness. It is a painful and difficult time for a number of families at St. Mark's.
